Backing the dog trials for generations



Let's make new the cliché. Behind every successful dog trialist is a great support crew. Behind every successful dog trials is a hard-working team.

That Ben Omar's Anderson family name is synonymous with dog trialing not only in Omarama, but in New Zealand, goes without saying. Ginger's success has made the headlines many times in the past 51 years since, at age 19, he first qualified a dog for a national championship.

But what rarely makes the headlines is, between them, Ginger and Sylvia Anderson, of Ben Omar Station, have given a lifetime of service to Omarama's Collie Dog Club. Ginger has been president, secretary, is a life member and patron of the club. Sylvia quietly retired as secretary only two years ago after almost 20 years of service and, if asked, downplays her contribution.

But let's face it, we know a secretary's job is to think of everything. And because it is small club and not slow to put its hand up to host major events that person tends to have to wear a lot of hats.

This week's Tux South Island and New Zealand dog trial championships are the third to be hosted by the Omarama club.

"[Because] It's the best venue in New Zealand, not that I'm biased," Ginger says.

In 1915, the Anderson family, along with the Aubreys, McAughtries and Waldrons played a pivotal role in forming the Omarama club at its present grounds.

Fire! Fire!

As a child in Omarama those words were terrifying. In the midfifties the Omarama Hall burned down. It was situated where the Merino Cafe now stands. I remember the intensity of the blaze of the old wooden building and the men desperately rolling drums of fuel out of a large wooden shed between the Hall and the hotel. A bucket chain from a near by stream cooled the shed wall and saved the shed igniting. If the shed had ignited the hotel would have been next.

Fire! Fire! Woke me just a couple of years later when Collins Shop and home burst into flames - it was situated where the Mobil garage and Oasis Cafe now are. Sadie and Arthur Collins and their two Children escaped but their home and business was gone. I was thirteen when I heard those words yelled by my father yet again and the terror was ours this time. A petrol generator had caught fire in a shed near our house at Totara Peak Station. There was no help. No fire brigade no phone. My father and mother fought to save the house and the land. I remember seeing the light shades fall from the ceiling as it was engulfed with flames. We left the ashes and drove to Omarama for help in the middle of the night. I still live in terror of fire. A short time later the homestead at Ben Avon burnt to the ground. Thanks the Fred Hondelink and others the Omarama Volunteer Fire Brigade was formed.

It's official and you're invited

An official ceremony to mark the re-opening of Omarama's community library will take place at the Omarama Community Centre 2pm, Wednesday, June 1. Waitaki mayor Gary Kircher will cut the ribbon and Waitaha Trust chairwoman Anne Te Maiharoa-Dodds will give the karakia.

Earlier this year community representatives, met with Waitaki District Council staff to discuss relocating the library from the Omarama Primary School to the Community Centre. "We agreed that two rooms in the refurbished community hall would be ideal for the library and we've been very fortunate to have shelving donated and a new computer system has been set up," Waitaki District Libraries manager Philip van Zijl said.

"Council staff and volunteers have worked hard to have everything ready for the opening."

The library will be run by volunteers and more than 10 people have offered to help, he said. Opening hours will be on Wednesdays, 11.30am to 1.30pm, and Saturdays 10am to 12pm.n"These times could be adjusted in future, according to demand," Mr van Zijl said.

An afternoon tea will be served after the official ceremony.



Craig puts his hand up for a second term

Omarama business owner Craig Dawson has signalled he will once again stand for councillor at this year's local elections in October.

Craig, who with wife Glenys, own GlenCraigs Clothing, first stood for local body politics in 2006 and served as an Ahuriri Community Board member for four years before a three-year stint as Ahuriri Ward councillor on the Waitaki District Council.

He stood down from that role in 2013, citing poor remuneration for travel expenses, the extensive travel and the problems of juggling business and council demands.

"Those problems are still there," he said.

"[But] It has been good to have three years off.

"I've missed being involved in the area. It will be good to get back in and tackle the big issues again."

Craig is secretary of the Omarama Residents' Association.

Present Ahuriri Ward councillor Dr June Slee will not be seeking re-election. Dr Slee told the Otago Daily Times, while it had been a difficult decision to step away from politics, she wanted to spend more time travelling and writing. What's stat?

We knew we were busy. Now there are the stats to prove it.

Last month, Statistics New Zealand released its accommodation survey for March this year. It shows 12.3% more beds were made-up throughout the country compared with March 2015.

Although figures for March were boosted by an early Easter, they were the highest recorded for any March month since records began, Statistics New Zealand business indicators senior manager Neil Kelly said. Guest nights were up for all regions, across all accommodation types from hotels to holiday parks, and for all visitors, domestic and international.

And all those visitors were flashing the plastic. The Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment (MBIE) released its index of visitor spending for March 2016 which it bases on electronic card transactions. Here's how MBIE says; 'I need to buy another suitcase, I've bought too many shoes'.

"The average international index for the 12 months ending March 2016 was 118, i.e. 18%the average spend in 2008. This index continues its increase from December 2013. International visitor spending in March 2016 (an index of 153) was greater than compared with March 2015 (an index of 139), indicating strong nationwide performance for March 2016."

To sum up, the figures show interna-

tional spending across the country is up 14% on last year.

MBIE has gone on to predict tourism spend will grow 65% to \$16 billion by 2022.

In a statement issued by the Waitaki District Council,2 Ocean joint committee chairman and Ohau Lodge owner Mike Neilson said people cycling the Alps 2 Ocean Cycle Trail were playing their part in the increase of tourism in this region.

"Alps 2 Ocean guest nights at Lake Ohau Lodge have risen by 19% to almost 2,000 and now account for nearly 16% of our summer business," Mr Neilson said.

"Our total guest nights for the summer rose by 22%."

In the same statement, Tourism Waitaki general manager Jason Gaskill said the tourism industry was quite buoyant, with more people coming into the district.

"We have more people doing more things, and the economic impact of that is starting to show," Mr Gaskill said.

"Alps 2 Ocean is a big part of that, contributing to the increased number of visitor nights and retail spending, and is steadily becoming a central piece of our regional identity."



Changes to water services cause concern

A change to how water services in the Ahuriri ward are managed on a dayto-day basis has come as a surprise to its Community Board.

From July 1 contracting company SouthRoads will take up the Waitaki District Council maintenance contract for water, wastewater and stormwater reticulation (pipes, connections, manholes and so on) in the Ahuriri area – which includes Kurow, Otematata, Omarama and Ohau. It has

sub-contracted some of the wastewater works to SJ Allen Contracting. SouthRoads replaces Whitestone Contracting who did not tender for the new contract. Whitestone Contracting employed one person to be stationed in Omarama to service the surrounding area.

In a statement, the council said because of the small workload in the Ahuriri area, it was unaffordable for contractors to base staff here and SouthRoads would run its maintenance service from its Oamaru depot.

"This will not impact on the quality or timeliness of work done – there will continue to be a two-day deadline for the contractor to respond to any non-urgent maintenance work."

There could be "a slight delay" before work started on a job because staff would not be "immediately on hand".

"The only change we have made to the contract conditions is that we will allow the new contractor two hours instead of one hour to respond to urgent issues – such as water main bursts.

"These issues only happen on rare occasions and can be dealt with in the first instance by local plumbers, if required (for example, they can turn off the main until the contractor arrives to fix the main)."

Ahuriri Community Board Chairman Graham Sullivan said, although the board was aware the contract had changed hands, it had been told nothing about how the contract was to work and that was of concern.

It was "disappointing" there would be no-one in the Ahuriri to look after water, he said.

Board member and Omarama resident Michael Blackstock said he was disappointed Whitestone Contracting had not put in a tender to continue with the contract. "We will have to wait and see how this plays out."

It could have major repercussions if, for example, there was a disruption to the water supply during the busy tourist season and to visitors who were expecting "first class service" during their stay.

As well, in the case of Omarama and Lake Ohau the nearest plumbers were in Twizel and Otematata.

"If the mains burst how long do we have before the tanks on the hill run out of water," he said.

The council advises anyone with an issue with water, wastewater or stormwater reticulation, to call its customer contact team on 0800 108 081.

It would make sure the contractor was alerted and the issue dealt with as quickly as possible.

Sunny and warm start to duck shooting season

Duck shooting season opened warm and bright this year.

Omarama shooter Jason Rogers said it was "one of the warmest openings ever". "We should be ice skating."

However, he also said it was one of the best opening shoots he had experienced. Jason and friends bagged 29 birds before retiring for the day.

They also took part in Fish and Game New Zealand's Mallard duck research programme.

Up, up and away

Anyone looking skyward just after noon on May 17 could not have missed this floating across the big sky.

Nasa launched its scientific super pressure balloon from Wanaka Airport at 11.45.

It was not fully inflated but estimated to be at about 12,000m when it passed over Omarama at 12.30pm.

As it rose, carrying its scientific payload and travelling at about 300m per minute, the lower atmospheric pressure caused the balloon to fully inflate.

The balloon climbed to its predestined height of about 33.5km within the

predicted two to three days.

The goal is for the balloon to remain airborne for 100 days. After the mission is complete flight operators will find a safe place to bring the balloon down and recover the load. Nasa believes the balloon will circumnavigate the globe about the southern hemisphere's mid-latitudes once every one to three weeks, depending on wind speeds in the stratosphere.

Omarama branch of the Waitaki District Libraries

When it re-opens in the Omarama Community Centre, the Omarama branch will be the first community I library in the Waitaki District to be included in the Waitaki District Library Management System, Koha. This means that Omarama borrowers will be able to access the Waitaki District

Library catalogue and see all of the books and resources available in the Waitaki District Library collection. Advantages include a wider range of available material, and the ability to place a reserve on a particular item. To access and use the full library system, borrowers now need to enrol with Waitaki District Library, in Omarama. If you have already enrolled in Oamaru and have used the library service recently, you won't need to enrol again but please bring your existing library card or library number with you.

Most of you will have received a library membership form in your mailbox recently. For those who haven't, apologies - we ran out, but more are on the way. They will also be available at the opening today, Wednesday June 1, at 2pm, along with information packs detailing the available resources.

Completed forms can be returned at any time. For speedier enrolment please ensure that you bring ID and proof of residential address. You do not need to live in Waitaki to enrol in the library, but you do need a residential address within New Zealand.

At this stage, the library opening hours are: Wednesdays 11.30am to 1.30pm and Saturdays 10am to12pm. These hours are on a trial basis to see what best suits the community. The library will be staffed by two volunteers when open. No qualifications are required if you want to volunteer. Training is provided, and if you are not comfortable using the library computer system, there are paper-based alternatives. You don't need to be a techno-whizz at all.

A big thank you to Michael Blackstock who has equipped us with a bag of milo, tea, coffee, Splenda, and a tin of Anzac biscuits, which we will store in the library for use by librarians /patrons, as and when required.

Hi everyone, nothing of note to report but with winter all of a sudden arriving so does winter driving conditions, couple of things to remember: Look out for shaded areas caused by high banks and tall trees where roads freeze sooner and ice may not thaw during the day. Bridges can also stay slippery longer than other road surfaces, so slow down before crossing. With the above examples in mind don't forget the cutting near Ben Omar Rd which is always treacherous and has even caught the odd local

out, as well as the Ahuriri Bridge which was pretty bad last year, so be careful. Double the two-second rule, leave a safe distance between you and the car you're following. Slow down, 5 minutes late is a lot better than not getting there at all. It's recommended that you have at least 3mm of tread for winter driving to better stop on wet roads. Make sure your windows are demisted before leaving home as well. I don't want to see your head sticking out the side window, (you know who you are :).

If you feel under the weather, make sure you flush yourself out with lots of water, rest up as much as you can, keep your house warm and dry, and try to keep away from others if you are feeling really unwell. Limit the spread of germs by good hand washing and sneezing into disposable tissues. Most importantly, let some fresh air work its magic from the inside.

The draft 2016/17 annual plan

The council received about 70 submissions to its annual plan. Those who chose to speak in support of their submissions were heard by the council last month.

At the hearings Ahuriri Community Board member Michael Blackstock asked for a year-round liquor ban in Omarama and Otematata.

At present, bans have been applied for

and cover only each Labour Weekend, Easter, Christmas and New Year. Craig Dawson spoke on behalf of the Omarama Residents and Ratepayers association and asked that the council set up and lead a group of concerned bodies to lobby the Government to introduce a levy on all visitors entering New Zealand. A fund set up from the levy could then be used to pay for improved facilities to cope with the increased numbers of visitors. Hot Tubs Omarama's formal contract with Tourism Waitaki to run an information centre had ended on March 31. Craig told the council there was a need for a stand-alone information centre to be set up as soon as possible.

He endorsed the installation of a dump station. This was put on hold by councillors at a meeting the previous day because more money is needed to pay for unplanned costs. The councillors will make their final decisions at a meeting on June 8 and the 2016/17 annual plan will be formally adopted on Wednesday, June 22.

The next meeting of the Ahuriri Community Board will be at the Kurow Memorial Hall, 3.15pm Monday, June 13.

The Mackenzie and Waitaki district councils are reviewing their policies about freedom camping and as part of that are asking the zone committee what it thinks. That feedback will be presented to the councils.

The committee has already been weighing up the potential impact of visitors on the recreational use of streams and rivers in the upper Waitaki. It championed a "Love your Lakes" education campaign which ran through the 2015/16 summer period and encouraged people to use public toilets and take their rubbish with them.

The committee also discussed whether or not to put up road signage at three entrances to the upper Waitaki to further publicise its campaign.

The next meeting of the Upper Waitaki Zone Committee is scheduled for June 17.

Sylvia, as a young dental nurse, married into the dog trialing world. Ginger could scarcely have escaped it.

His grandfather John brought dogs out from Scotland to work the huge Benmore run where he was head shepherd. After the break up of Benmore John established Riverina in 1921 and Ben Omar in 1923. He and Ginger's father lan were keen trialists and travelled throughout New Zealand to compete. John, who died in 1938, was a prime mover in establishing the first New Zealand championships in 1936. Until then major trials were island-only competitions. Ginger and Sylvia's son Johnny is the fourth generation on Ben Omar and also a successful trialist.

Unsurprisingly, Ginger began trialing as a school boy. He was one of nine pupils at Omarama School, the roll had crept up to 11 by the time he left.

"Omarama was very, very rural," he says. Largely a sheep and beef farming area there were many more 'married couples' on farms and Omarama was able to field two rugby teams.

He left school in 1962, won his first open in the North Otago championship in 1965, and, as well as all the other titles, has been New Zealand champion dog trialist three times since.

Ginger will campaign Boss, Don and Glen in the heading events at these championships. Two have Anderson blood – descended from the Anderson breed developed by grandfather John from those original Scottish imports. Mostly black and white and smooth-haired, the good ones are "born to be champs".

Sylvia took over from Jenny Williamson as secretary of Omarama's dog trial club in 1995. Jenny had been secretary for about 10 years. Omarama hosted its first New Zealand's in 1996, the second in 2006. There would always be a working bee ahead of any trials with "girls in the kitchen, boys stocking the bar," she says. For many years friend Nancy Munro would help in the office filling out cards and taking entries.

The world of dog trialing is "very social...you have a lot of fun" and the friendships just "pick up where we left off".

What she doesn't say is a long-serving secretary is an indispensable resource when presidents (elected every two years) and committee members come and go. From portaloos to programmes they deal with it all. Minute books become historical records. Phone calls, letters, emails and all those illegible messages scrawled on scraps of paper pass through their hands. Every coin, note and, nowadays, electronic transaction must be collected, distributed and accounted for. Trialists must be registered, names recorded, judging sheets deciphered, points totted up, officials notified, prizes selected, engraved , polished and awarded to the right person. Often also overseeing kitchen, bar and office, they are the first to arrive and the last to leave. And, for the past few months, this couple have once again rolled up their sleeves and got stuck-in with the rest of the championships committee – Simon Inkersell, Greg Metherell, Lisa Anderson, Rick Aubrey, Paul Collins, Ed Aubrey and Scott Hunter - to prepare for this week's event. In Omarama, the sport and competition is growing. There are more young people coming through and they tend to be "far better handlers", Ginger says.There will be a "good showing" from Omarama trialists this week, with three qualifying to campaign 10 dogs across the events. Ginger is joined by Edward Aubrey, of Dalrachney Station, and Scott Hunter who works at Longslip Station. But on the day, no matter how they have performed through the season, competitors start at level pegging. It's just the "luck of the draw with the sheep".

"If you're not a good sport you won't be a dog trialist for very long."

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The Garden Diary

I found treasure. The glimpse of plump crimson seeds through a slash in the lime-green, star-shaped pod was startling. I thought all my peony roses were sterile. I knew the bumble bees had been busy on this one. It is so delightfully gaudy with its single fuchsia-pink petals. The bees would crash land on its satiny petals and slide down deep into



the thick golden stamen. It must have done the trick. The hot summer sun warmed those pods golden brown, the crimson seeds baked until they were glossy mahogany and then burst through the seams.

We humans often think we are the most ingenious life-forms on the planet but I'm not so sure. Even before my first botany lesson I was intrigued by plants, and seeds never cease to amaze. Botany was the first lesson in thirdform science. It seemed the class was set up to be sleep-inducing. Directly after lunch, we sat at desks under sunny windows. Still clumsy with our fountain pens, we smudged our way through note-taking as the teacher, in a dry drone, read the day's lesson from a textbook. But I was riveted. That story about the Augustinian friar, Gregor Mendel, who became fixated with the lascivious habits of peas and started taking notes, wow! No? His discoveries became known as Mendel's Laws and he was bestowed the title 'Founder of the Science of Genetics'. Posthumously, of course, ain't it always the way? Anywho, he knew a bit about seeds.

Seeds can be as light and powdery as dust, chunky and intricately carved as wooden beads, there are hairy seeds, prickly seeds and most fun, helicopter seeds. But there is more to seeds than just their good looks.

Enclosed within each is code more complex than any ever invented. Utterly ingenious, it encapsulates the experience of generations within its heart and uses that to map its future. A plant will emerge from a seed as recognisable as its parent and yet unique. An apple will never be a banana. There are two important things a seed has to do with its time. It needs to move and find a home of its own (dispersal) and it needs to schedule its debut perfectly (breaking dormancy). Get it wrong and it's; 'goodbye, cruel world'. I do so admire the technique those conifers, which shall not be named, use to achieve domination. The cones will stay tightly shut until, just as if Indiana Jones had passed by, the exact amount of moisture and warmth hits the button. The compartments of the wooden cache snap open and the seed with its one wing launches itself out to just beyond the shade of its parent.

I might have been wise to leave the peony seeds where they were since they know best. But. So, 'the book' says sprout them in damp potting mix, refrigerate for 8 weeks, remove, wait 30-60 days, and then, voila! Or not. I wonder what colour they will be?
