ECan considers land sale process

Environment Canterbury will begin the process to return the land it owns in Omarama to the Crown before the end of the year, its director of finance and corporate services says.

In an email in answer to questions from the Omarama Gazette, Miles McConway, who is ECan's Director of Finance and Corporate Services, said negotiations with the Crown regarding the return of the land had not yet started although ECan did intend to commence this process before the end of 2016.

"In the meantime the houses located on the land will continue to be rented out as they are now."

The land in Omarama under ECan control is a 2.3ha block owned by the Crown that was vested in the regional council in 1989 when ECan was first set up.

"At that time pest control came under our remit and the land was owned by the Crown for that purpose and vested in Environment Canterbury as the authority in charge of pest control.

"On the ground pest control work as done in the past is no longer carried out by Environment Canterbury so we have no ongoing need for the property for this purpose and the land can now be returned to the Crown.

"Once the land has been returned it will be up to the Crown how it is sold/used in the future."

Essentially, ECan says it is unable to sell the land because it must be returned to the Crown. It expects that when this happens, because the Crown must follow certain procedures, it will still take some time before anything happened "on the site".



Getting away from it all

Campers were queued at gates to make sure they secured their favourite camping spots when the Waitaki Lakes camping grounds opened for the season last month.

Traditionally, thousands make the Waitaki District Council-owned camping grounds their home away from home for the entire summer.

The Omarama Gazette spoke to Oamaru camper Merv Wilson, who arrived at the Sailor's Cutting grounds on Thursday ahead of the Saturday morning opening, about the annual ritual.

Merv said many, like himself and his friends, had been using the same site for years and he wanted to make sure he secured it again this season. Despite the queues it was all very friendly. Those who were new campers were usually very understanding if it was pointed out to them that that site 'belonged' to another, he said.

Most years, by the Friday night the whole boat ramp area at Sailors Cutting was filled with campers and caravans waiting for the gates to open. And by 7am Saturday morning a large contingent which had set out early from Christchurch would arrive to take up their spots, he said. Gates opened at 8am. The camping ground season extends from the third Saturday in September to the first Sunday in May.

Omarama visit completes expedition

Expedition South team leader Al Fastier and his TE-20 model Ferguson tractor called into Omarama for fuel and kebabs on their return to homebase – Glenorchy.

They were returning from the Expedition South fundraising 'drive', tractor-style, which officially ended its 2012km road trip at Aoraki Mt Cook on September 19 after setting out from Piha, just outside Auckland, on August 23. The goal of the drive was to raise \$1 million to restore Hillary's Hut at Scott Base which was where Sir Edmund Hillary's Trans-Antarctic Expedition (TAE) of 1957-58 set off for the pole.

Al was joined for the journey by various supporters including Peter Hillary and Peter Scott.

Two Ferguson TE-20 models similar to those used by Sir Ed and one Massey Ferguson MF5600 made the journey which was the same distance as that travelled by Sir Ed and his team on that expedition.

When the Omarama Gazette met up with Al (a former Twizel resident) he said about \$700,000 had been raised.

Al spends his summers in Antarctica where he manages the on-site work for the trust, and he has overseen the conservation work done on Scott's and Shackleton's huts on Ross Island.

He returns to Scott Base this month to manage the conservation of Hillary's Hut this summer, before crossing to the other side of the continent to help the UK Antarctic Heritage Trust with their project on Horseshoe Island. Shear skills with blades at Longslip

Much has changed in Longslip Station's history but they still shear sheep the same way – with the blades.

Blade shearing contractor Mike Bool's team began the annual shear at Longslip last month.

It will continue for the best part of four weeks, during which time they will shear about 16,000 mostly merinos in three sheds – Longslip, Ben Avon and Birdwood.

This year's team includes Ross Kelman, Matt Parsons and Kate Wilson, of Omarama.

The wool is destined for Elders auction in Christchurch.

Longslip marked its 150th anniversary in 2008.

The first pastoral lease was taken out by Robert McMurdo on September 5, 1858.

The Patterson family has held the lease of Longslip since 1947.

Tenure Review was completed and freehold granted in 2008.

Patient care assured even if beds are full

Waitaki District Health Services Ltd's chief executive Robert Gonzales has moved to assure the public Oamaru Hospital has measures in place so patients will receive appropriate care in an emergency even if its beds are full.

Mr Gonzales has issued a statement in response to concerns raised by elderly in the community about access to services if the hospital's Takaro Ward was fully occupied.

"I cannot emphasise enough that all patients will be taken care of appropriately, and should never hesitate in an emergency," he said The hospital, together with Oamaru GPs, St John Ambulance and Dunedin Hospital, had contingencies in place to ensure any patient, regardless of age, was properly and safely taken care of, he said.

The hospital originally provided 30 rural inpatient and assessment, treatment and rehabilitation beds, but from April 2016 reduced this to 24 beds to meet the funding it received.

At that time, Mr Gonzales said that meant all beds would be occupied more frequently than in the past – with 30 beds the hospital reached capacity four to six times a year, with 24 beds this would occur more frequently.

Processes for inpatient admissions and transfers would not change and they would be treated the same way as in the past when bed capacity was reached, including more treatment in the community, if it was safe, or transferring acute care patients to Dunedin.

When the hospital reached full capacity, a limit was placed on admissions for between 24 to 48 hours, he said.

Oamaru GPs, St John, Residential Care Facilities, Dunedin and Timaru Hospitals are emailed to say that the Oamaru Hospital inpatient ward was closed to admissions, and are asked for their support for the duration. In such an event the group had agreed it would take the following actions.

- Patients with minor ailments would be expected to see their GP for treatment in the first instance;
- Patients who needed further treatment and hospital admission would be assessed by their GP, St John or Oamaru Emergency Department in consultation with Dunedin Hospital emergency department, for transfer to Dunedin Hospital.
- Major trauma and surgical emergency patients would be transported straight to Dunedin Hospital by St John ambulance in all cases. However, appropriate support would be provided by the Oamaru Emergency Department if required for example limb stabilisation, intravenous therapy, radiology and laboratory services;
- It was possible patients may be discharged following assessment at the Dunedin Hospital emergency department. All patients should be informed of this possibility and given the opportunity to make their own transport arrangements, if necessary, back to Oamaru.

The Community Reports Upper Waitaki Police news



Earlier this month I had a short pursuit with a 19 year old male who decided that he would try running from police. He was initially seen speeding at 134 kph. Believing that he was on 75 demerits (max allowed is 100) he thought he would lose his licence if he got another ticket. In his wisdom he decided to risk his, mine, the public and his passengers life when he attempted to flee police rather than get a ticket. He reached speeds up to 186kp. With the assistance of Twizel police he

was nabbed on the outskirts from Twizel. He was arrested and instantly suspended from driving for 28 days. He is due in Court this month where he will face a fine and further disqualification. Funnily enough if he had pulled over he would have been issued a fairly hefty fine for sure, but he also would have been able to drive away as his demerits were actually only 35! As previously mentioned by the Omarama Gazette, there was a theft of a large Tandem trailer from Omarama Airfield earlier this month. Please be aware that we have people from all walks of life passing through this area, unfortunately they may not have the same principles as us. So keep things locked up and keep an eye out for each other.

I've attended a couple of car crashes in the last month or so, mainly due to people not driving to the conditions. Thankfully these have been fairly minor with no major injuries. But remember to ease up a bit if its raining or foggy. Especially if we haven't had rain for a while as the roads can be treacherous, even small amounts, can make road surfaces that have been dry for days as slippery as ice and a potential danger for unsuspecting drivers.

I think it also timely to remind all dog owners out there that they need to keep their dogs locked up. I know this can be easier said than done, but be aware that if your dog goes walking and begins worrying sheep the farmer is well within his right to protect his stock which will most likely be by shooting the dog. Unfortunately for all involved we recently had 2 dogs that had escaped and began chasing sheep, one of these dogs was shot. This was unfortunate for all involved especially the owners who have lost a loved pet. It's my understanding that there are some rumours now floating around about this, so here's the facts so there is no misunderstanding.

2 Dogs were loose in a paddock near Omarama Township.

There were pregnant ewes in that paddock.

The dogs were chasing these pregnant ewes.

There is an independent witness who confirms this.

Waitaki District Council news in brief



Restaurants, bars and clubs - all those who may require a special licence to host a function are being urged to think ahead. Special licence applications must be lodged at least 20 working days before the event. The period between 20 December 2016 and 15 January 2017 are not considered working days under the Sale and Supply of Alcohol legislation. This could cause problems for events planned between January 15, 2017 and February 14, 2017.

This includes Waitangi Day on February 6. For events that occur between December 20 and February 7 the application must be received by the council before 22 November 2016.

The Waitaki District Responsible Freedom Camping Bylaw 2016 has been approved by the council.

Freedom campers in Waitaki will be allowed to camp in the same spot for a maximum of three days over a four-week period; campervans used for freedom camping will be required to meet national standards for self-containment, and freedom camping will be prohibited in 79 named reserves across the district.

An amount of \$56,000 has been set aside for policing the bylaw, and education about the new rules.

The 2016 elections in Omarama - a reminder to vote

Voting documents for the postal ballot to elect candidates to local government have been delivered to households. Electors can post the documents back to electoral officers as soon as they have voted. October 8 is polling day. Voting documents must be at the council before voting closes at 12 noon. Preliminary results (i.e. once all 'ordinary' votes are counted) will be available as soon as possible afterwards. Official results (including all valid ordinary and special votes) will be declared from October 13. Omarama businessmen Craig Dawson and Tony Chapman were elected unopposed to the Waitaki District Council and Ahuriri Community Board respectively.

Two nominations have been received for mayor, incumbent Gary Kircher and Palmerston business man Stephen Wesselingh.

Environment Canterbury news in brief

The clearing of willows at the confluence of the Willowburn Stream and Ahuriri River produced little in the way of useful fire wood, ECan's Upper Waitaki Zone Committee member Richard Subtil says.

In August, contractors began clearing the willows beside the Department of Conservation campsite as part of a joint project with land owners, DoC, Rūnanga and Alps to Ocean to improve water quality.

It was initially thought wood could be used to help provide heating for Omarama residents.

"[However, the work] yielded little of worth, there was not the quality of timber expected.

"The remainder will likely be burned," Richard says.

Further willow removal will occur over the next two or three years through spraying and removing the trunks and branches.



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

The Garden Diary




Just mucking about

So, this friend pops in, opens a plastic bag, and says "take a look at this". In it there's a finely-cut mixture of fresh grass clippings, earthy-brown leaves and herby, musky horse manure. I look back at her and know we understand each other. Us gardeners do have the reputation for hoarding all kinds of weird and wonderful 'organic by-products' but

there is method in what significant

others and non-gardeners like to (quite rudely?) call madness. It's called giving back. All through the growing season plants dig deep and draw up goodness from the soil. When we harvest or clear it we interrupt the natural cycle and take away what would naturally fall back to the ground and be transformed by busy soil organisms into nutrients for another generation of plant life. Some people redress that by feeding out compost – so skilled are they that they churn out mounds of magnificent mixtures, darker and denser than grandma's Christmas pudding. Alas, despite knowing the recipe, I am not blessed with that particular 'Great British Bake-off' quality. But I hate to see bare soil. I hate the thought of the wind and sun sucking it dry to dust to fly east on the back of the next warm nor'wester. And the weeds laughing as they move in. Like doting grandma following around her teenage granddaughter I itch to tweak and cover it up. Layers do the trick nicely. I spread and cover with layers of whatever I have to hand at the time. All the while thinking of the plant and what lies beneath. I like to visualise the soil teeming with well-nourished and fit organisms who are doing the heavy lifting and mixing for me. I'm no soil or plant scientist but I have assimilated some quite random and useful trivia over time. (Remember: the internet is the home of the genie who will answer any gardening query at a click.) Sheep poo is apparently the most completely nutritious manure meal plus it can be applied immediately. Others like chook and elephant poo need to be 'aged' a bit so they don't 'burn' the plant. Not all plants like the same diet. The pretty cowslip was named for its penchant for growing in paddocks near cow pats. Potatoes do not like chook poo. Polyanthus and primulas love rabbit poo. And thanks to *The Fastest Indian* we all know what lemon trees like. Plants, like people, can overindulge to the detriment of their health. Here come those two party-crushing words again - 'in moderation'. So, back to the plastic bag - A recipe for nutritious mulch or quick compost. Chuck horse manure on the fallen leaves on the lawn. Mow the lot together, if it's still too chunky run over it again. Rake it up into a wool fadge or black polythene bag snipped with holes. Keep moist . Feed out as required. Yum! PS She also dropped in a recipe for Whiskey Cake—let's just see if I can't get the two muddled up. - Ruth Grundy (I garden a small space under a big sky in Omarama)
