Speculation 'inappropriate' - St John, Fenz

Hato Hone St John and Fire and Emergency New Zealand say it is "inappropriate to speculate" about the outcome of its review of its 2020 Memorandum of Understanding next month.

The Ōmārama community recently held a public forum to voice concerns about St John withholding medical 111 calls from the community-owned and funded Fire Brigade First Response unit.

The community and the first response volunteers want the unit to be dispatched to all medical calls because it has the equipment and can provide the skills to administer a high level of emergency care until an ambulance arrives. It can be on scene quickly whereas the nearest St John ambulance service and doctor is 30km (20 minutes) away.

Since the forum, and in response to the concerns raised, St John and Fenz have told the community they will commence a review of the present MOU "no later than" November 1.

After the forum they issued a joint media statement to say they will send the First Response to medical calls as per the 'enhanced trial' in the meantime. However, there has been no assurance this will necessarily be formalised at the review. Nor has there been any indication the agreement would include local arrangements with other first response units that want the same agreement -a number of whom were represented at the forum or sent letters of support.

Understandably, there are plenty who do speculate that if both St John and Fenz backed the plan to send Fenz first response units to all call outs in areas where there is no ambulance then the appropriate change to the MOU ought to be a foregone conclusion.

The enhanced first response trial which has had a 'stop start' history since 2017 is a local agreement with Ōmārama which means St John will call the first response unit to less severe medical calls than other first responders in the rest of the country who only attend life-threatening or serious incidents.

St John is the lead agency for all medical calls under the MOU.

On Monday, the Ōmārama Gazette put these questions to Fenz and St John. Who, from St John and Fenz, will be putting the Ōmārama case to the meeting of the Interagency Support Focus Group reviewing the MOU, and what will the recommendation be?

Will they support the community's request, yes or no?

In response, St John issued a statement to be attributed to Southland Otago District operations manager Pauline Buchanan which says this;

"We're continuing to work closely with Fire and Emergency NZ towards the review of the current MOU in November. It would be inappropriate to speculate on the recommendation or outcome of that process, but we will endeavour to keep the community informed as it progresses."

And Fenz gave a corresponding response in a statement to be attributed to Fenz Region Manager, Mike Grant which says;

"Discussions about the Memorandum of Understanding between Fire and Emergency New Zealand and St John are expected to start in November. In the meantime, we are continuing to work with St John to discuss our Medical First Response Brigades. It would be inappropriate to speculate on the outcome of the November discussions but we are very mindful of the community and the brigade's support during this time."

After the forum Mrs Buchanan and Fire and Emergency New Zealand acting specialist response manager Cam Grylls wrote to the Residents' Association of Ōmārama, who hosted the event, to clarify their stance, and that letter was presented to its meeting last month.

"While we acknowledge there were several representatives from other Fire and Emergency First Response Units at the Ōmārama meeting, it is important to note that this enhanced response criteria only applies to Ōmārama at this time, where it will be responded to all jobs including green incidents within their normal response area. "It is, and has always been, an extension of the current St John and Fire and Emergency MOU. Therefore, it is crucial that we abide by the original intent of the MOU and the agreement with Ōmārama until a review of the MOU between both agencies is completed."

The MOU states that the parties will meet annually to review the MOU "following internal stakeholder engagement".

"Amendments, variations and alterations to the MOU and the attached schedules may be made by the incumbents of the roles named in the schedules, or the current equivalent role, or by the chief executive officers." it says.

The MOU Interagency Support Focus Group is made up of these agencies: St John; Fenz; Wellington Free Ambulance; NZ Professional Firefighters Union; United Fire Brigades' Association; Fire and Emergency Commanders Association; Rural Professionals Association; Fire and Emergency Comcen and On-road Paramedic/Intensive Care Paramedic.

Fire First Response units are not represented.

In order for the local agreement with the Ōmārama First Response to be formally recognised it must be included in this MOU.

The community is petitioning Parliament to ask that St John and Fenz allow Ōmārama First Response to respond to 111 medical and personal alarm calls in the Ōmārama call-out area, regardless of acuity.

The petition is available on line and at most local businesses.

The annual meeting of the Ōmārama and Districts Community Co-Response Trust is 7pm Monday, October 10, 2022, at the Ōmārama Fire Station.

FACT BOX: WHAT IS THE MOU AND HOW CAN IT BE CHANGED

The MOU is the legal document which sets out in detail how the collaboration between the St John and Fenz will be managed as a working relationship and how the duties and functions of both will be supported.

This standard national document supersedes all local documents. However, the MOU does make provision for local agreements.

In the MOU, St John and Fenz agree to consult with all parties, including communities, over changes and to resolve disputes.

The MOU is to be reviewed annually by its Focus group and relevant changes made.

The MOU is categorical, it is St John that decides whether there is a continuing need for a first response unit, and it decides if a station can be a first response.

Fenz First Response and Co-response units always operate under the guidance of St John.

Haere mai, Jack, everything is Kapai :)

Ōmārama local Jack Zorab was one of 10 Waitaki residents who hail from across the globe to become a citizen of Aotearoa-New Zealand, last month.

The new citizens were welcomed to the Moeraki marae with a haka pōwhiri supported by Kurinui (Hampden) School and Moeraki whānau, led by Upoko David Higgins and Moeraki Ltd chairperson Trevor McGlinchey, in a ceremony co-hosted by Te Rūnanga o Moeraki and the Waitaki District Council.

It is the first time the council and the Rūnanga have hosted the ceremony together and also is the first 'in-person' citizenship ceremony in Waitaki since the impact of Covid-19 restrictions.

Waitaki Mayor Gary Kircher welcomed the group from the Philippines, South Africa, Chile, the United Kingdom and India before hearing their readings of affirmations and oaths.

Here as a token – because every Kiwi has to have one - is my mum's authentic recipe for pavlova, handed down through the generations from the time it was first invented on **our** shores and the puffy meringue-like confection dazzled and danced across our dining tables.

(BTW you may well get a few tips from the 'aunties' before you perfect it, tho - just saying!)

As well, 'cos the day will come when you need to 'take a plate', here is a recipe for that time-honoured southern sushi, the cheese roll. However, be forewarned, there is more than one 'genuine' recipe out there for this scrumptious wee delight, too.

Pavlova

4 egg whites – beat 2 tbsp water – add (optional) 1 cup of sugar – add slowly Fold in: 1 tsp cornflour 1 tsp vinegar 1 tsp vanilla 1/4 tsp cream of tartar Bake 1/2 to 2 hours at 150C.

Cheese rolls

500g grated cheese

1 tin evaporated milk

1 pkt Maggi onion soup mix

1 finely chopped onion

1 tsp mustard powder

1 cup cream.

Heat in the microwave for six minutes, stirring in between times. Cool spread onto white bread.

Roll by folding in three.

Toast, butter and serve.

Life coach to share tried and true tips

The Otago Rural Support Trust is bringing former policeman and life coach Lance Burdett, founder of WARN International, to Kurow next month.

The event is not only for farmers. The invitation has been extended to anyone who wishes to attend, Rural Support Trust coordinator Lindsay Purvis said.

Mr Burdett, who is a former police crisis negotiator who has worked in Australia and New Zealand and with the FBI, specialises in giving people the tools to deal with anxiety.

An entertaining keynote speaker, Mr Burdett's presentations are noted for being grounded in neuroscience, based on contemporary research, and peppered with plenty of practical experience and advice.

During his 22-year police career, he spent 13 years as a crisis negotiator working on such cases as the Napier siege. He has taught and continues to teach crisis intervention techniques to police negotiators.

Working in the police emergency call centre he developed coaching sessions about how to deal with difficult people and about personal resilience, programmes which have been adopted nationally and now form part of the training for all emergency call centre staff.

Through his organisation he runs training courses to help individuals and organisations manage the effects of stress, teaching how to improve communication skills, manage safety and security, and how to develop resilience.

He includes practical techniques for changing negative thoughts, how to get to sleep and stay asleep and ways to boost energy and motivate yourself.



Along with his coaching workshops he has published two books – Behind the Tape, Life on the Police Frontline, and Dark Side of the Brain, Adapting to Adversity. He is writing a third book about anxiety.

Dedicated Ahuriri advocate signs off

This week's Waitaki District Council meeting was the last for retiring elected members; Deputy Mayor Melanie Tavendale, Councillor Bill Kingan, Councillor Colin Wollstein, and Ahuriri Community Board chairperson Vicky Munro, who each gave a valedictory speech at the meeting.

Mrs Munro has served as a dedicated advocate for the Ahuriri Ward since the 2014 by-election. The Ahuriri Ward is Waitaki's largest ward by land area as it stretches from Duntroon to Ōhau – making up 59% of the Waitaki District. Her speech is shared here:
